18th Fall Family Days 2013

The upcoming Fall Family Days will be our 18th Annual Event; my how time flies. This year the Theme will be Soybeans and Related Products derived from the soybeans. We are very excited about this theme as it will be the first time that we have ever focused on soybeans. Before the year is over we will all learn more about this crop than we could imagine. Here's just a taste of what is to come. Soybean is an annual crop plant of the pea family native to China and Japan but wildly grown for its seeds which contain much protein and oil. Soybeans were introduced to Michigan in the early 1920's when Henry Ford began raising them on eventually 12,000 acres. He was making plastic out of the beans that was used in the construction of the Model A. Soybeans were introduced in the Thumb in the 60's and there was some concern if they would grow further North because of the weather and genetics. From the hardware to the grocery store, soybeans touch our lives everyday and truly it is a Miracle Crop.

Our 2012 FFD was very successful due in part to all the volunteers that help during the weekend after Labor Day. 

Thumb Octagon Barn Agricultural Museum Committee

The committee is pleased to report that ACE American Alarm has installed a Fire and Break-in security system in the Octagon Barn and the Purdy Home with the possibility of covering other building as requested. Karl DeSimpelare arranged for five different security companies to submit proposals for the project before settling on ACE. The system took many days to install and they worked very hard to make the installation as unnoticeable as possible.

Some of the other Museum accomplishments include signage for the buildings and the entrance to the Barn to aid visitors while touring the Thumb Octagon Barn Agricultural Museum. Seven

displays have been organized and started on the North and South lofts and work is underway to develop a Volunteer Board that will be in the Welcome Area.
