To my dear Friends of the Thumb Octagon Barn Agricultural Museum from Martin Kubacki, Fall Family Days Chairman.


Our 19th Annual Fall Family Days Event will begin on Friday, Sept. 5th at 4:00 p.m. with a fish dinner prepared by Greg Talaski of Kinde, co-chairs La-Vonne and George Pettinger and numerous hardworking volunteers. Dinner will be served until 7 p.m. Following the fish dinner, visitors can move to the Barn to listen to some good ole time music performed by the Eastern Michigan Music Makers. On Saturday the 6th and Sunday the 7th, the show is open from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. There is something for the whole family including agriculture field demonstrations, the Purdy home and Octagon Barn tours, crafters and flea market vendors, children's activities as well as many tasty treats. Each day at 3:00 p.m. there will be a parade of antique tractors and equipment. Before the Parade, at 2:30 p.m., Tori Pine is organizing a Fashion Show featuring APRONS AT WORK when aprons from the 20's and 30's will be modeled. You might even see Cora Purdy's apron that she wore while in the kitchen of the Purdy Home.

This year we are featuring Michigan Apples with many demonstrations going on daily. Don't miss the bee honey extraction demonstrations at 10:15 a.m. and 2:15 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday located in the theme tent next to the Purdy Home. At the cider mill, which is located next door to the grain elevator at the east end of the grounds, there will be a cider press demonstration. In honor of our theme, you will be able to purchase a yummy slice of apple pie, baked by our friends at the Knights of Columbus of Caro. This will be served right next to the homemade ice cream made by the Thumb Antique Car Club. Other delicious, old fashioned goodies including hog kettle popcorn, donuts, fresh squeezed apple cider and cotton candy will be back to enjoy as well. The sorghum evaporator will be going again and there will be sorghum syrup and delicious caramel corn for sale. The basic food concession will be run by McDonald's Food and Family Center of Bad Axe. A Little Bit of History



The Octagon Barn was built in 1923 and finished in 1924 which means that the Barn is 90 years old. Back in 1994, Doug Monroe brought a good

friend of his to a Barn meeting. He knew that this friend had the knowledge, skill and hopefully the passion to undertake the restoration of the Octagon Barn. The friend was Bob Hirn and, thanks to Doug, Bob got involved and the rest is history. Doug said, "Bob had the foresight and ingenuity to know how to see the Barn brought back to its original condition. Perhaps he was the only one who had the capacity to accomplish this task and certainly the passion. He had the knowledge and skills to bring together laborers, builders and suppliers." The boulder, shown above, that has the plague affixed to it is from the grounds and was used to block the entry to the powerhouse. Bob & Doug both wanted to preserve that bolder. Well, it has been preserved and recognizes all of the many volunteers that contributed to bringing the Barn back to Mr. Purdy's dream of building an 'air castle' like the one he had seen while traveling in Iowa. The message on the rock reads, "Somewhere James Purdy and the Munro Brothers are saying, 'Our dream is very much alive in the conscience of Bob Hirn. The Barn is once again truly magnificent."

Accounts of his travels can be found, however, in storekeepers' books or land records. It is known that John Chapman traveled west each spring to plant trees and tend his orchards and returned east each fall to gather more seeds.
