21st Fall Family Day 2016 featuring "Our Wonderful World of Water."

Dear Friends of the Thumb Octagon Barn,

The 21st Thumb Octagon Barn Fall Family Days is planned to be another great event. This year's theme "Our Wonderful World of Water" promises to be a good one. So stop by the Theme Tent and check it out. All the committees are putting the final touches in place and are getting ready.

We will once again begin with the Fish Fry with our own Fish Fry expert, Greg Talaski. It starts at 4:00 p.m. Friday afternoon, September 9th in the Munro Building and will be served until 7:00 p.m. or until we run out. Prices are \$10.00 for adults, children (6–12) \$5.00 and children under 5 are free. Gates open at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday with breakfast served from 8 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Saturday and on Sunday from 8:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. on Sunday prepared by the Caro Knights of Columbus. The cost of breakfast is \$7.00 for adults with children under 12 \$5.00. The site is open from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Daily gate admission on Saturday and Sunday is \$5.00 per person 6 and older.

Demonstrations will start in the morning and will include digging potatoes that is one of our spectators' favorites. There will be threshing, baling, an operating grist mill, com shelling, corn binders and silage cutting. Also, returning will be horse drawn wagon rides, sorghum pressing and evaporating, children's activities, barrel train rides, apple cider pressing, the blacksmith shop in action, wood shingles and log sawing. Our visitors will also enjoy the house tours, schoolhouse activities and programs and a working grain elevator. The Elevator has had a big addition put on over the last year, so stop by and see what has been added. Also, we will have a new look in our music area with different bands playing on Saturday and Saturday evening. The music will continue with Sunday morning gospel and some good old Country music on Sunday afternoon.

There will again be plenty to eat and drink including: homemade pie, French fries, donuts, bean soup, cotton candy, home-made ice cream made by the Thumb Area Antique Car Club, apple cider, kettle popcorn and concessions on the grounds. We bet you'll have a hard time picking your favorite.

Another big part of our Event to see is the old engine displays and our huge antique tractor display with over 100 tractors. Also, don't miss our huge flea market with over 250 crafters and vendors.

Frank Franzel of Franzel Well Drilling from Mayville has drilled two wells on the Thumb Agricultural Museum site at no charge to the Friends. Frank also plans on being at FFD to share information on well-drilling and the equipment used to produce water for household needs. We are very excited to have this new demonstration for FFD and thank Frank for all of his efforts on behalf of the Thumb Agricultural Museum. Certainly this will demonstrate "Our Wonderful World of Water" and the importance of water in our lives and what it takes to get water to the surface and into your glass.

We will again provide a site map when you arrive showing the locations for all the activities and demonstrations that are taking place. We have built more people movers to handle getting folks to the grounds. Parking was a big worry last year and some improvements have been made and I'm very certain that it will work perfectly. Remember that all spectators have to enter from Bay City Forestville Rd. You cannot enter from the


Barn Restoration

In our Winter Newsletter, **Dennis Anderson** identified the following needs of the Octagon Barn: a new roof, electrical upgrade and window repairs and painting. Work is already underway on several of these areas of concern. The windows are being repaired, painted and structurally corrected to hopefully solve the problem of water damage.

When Richard Stacer started working on the windows, he made a sad discovery. Because the sill was level, when it rained, the water built up behind the sill resulting in the trim boards and sills eventually rotting. So new sills and trim boards were needed. Now when they are installed they will be on an angle so that the build-up of water hopefully will not occur. Working on the window project with **Richard Stacer is David Jaroch, Terry Keinath & Ron Hoffman**.

Two teas were hosted in the Purdy Home that is such a very lovely setting for these occasions. It is wonderful to showcase this beautifully restored house that is not your typical farmstead. Many volunteer hours have been dedicated to bringing back the ornate beauty that originally was designed into this house.

The Friends of the Octagon Barn hosted its first tea party of the year on July 28, 2016 during our Open House Weekend. The theme was "Christmas in July." The house was simply decorated just as Mrs. Cora Purdy would have done while living in the house. She loved to use red bows and fresh greens. About a dozen ladies enjoyed the chicken salad croissants, along with salads and homemade cut Christmas cookies. The ladies were greeted on the port-co-cheer with Christmas songs on the harp played by Sharron Patterson. Rose Putnam read the story written by Florence Purdy Moore, daughter of James and Cora Purdy, called "Christmas on the Farm", a delightful tale of a young girl on a farm. This story can be found in the historical account of the Octagon Barn "The Mud Lake Estate." We think Cora Purdy would be proud of the gathering, much the same as she would have hosted back in the early 1930's.

On August 4th our Host Couple Ladies volunteered to host a themed, dessert tea that would include a presentation about "Woman Suffrage." presented by Carol Cavalry, volunteer and Friend of the Octagon Barn. Since this is a Presidential election year, it was felt that this was a very timely topic to look back at the efforts to give women the right to vote. The movement began in Great Britain in the late 1800's and was lead in this country by Susan B. Anthony & Lucretius Mott. As a result of the efforts of many, on August 26.1920 the 19th amendment was adopted. As Carol researched this topic she was somewhat surprised to learn of the struggle that women went through fighting for this right. Many lost their children, homes and marriages while pursuing this effort.





Veronica's father, Willis Stoic, bought their farm on Kirk Road, Vassar, where she grew up around 1940. The granary was already on the farm at that time. The granary is believed to have been constructed circa 1920.

Last year the Haines attended FFD and visited the Grain Elevator and decided that this was the perfect home for their 1920's granary. So the site needed to be prepared for placement of the granary that also needed to be structurally reinforced for the move from north of

Vassar to the Thumb Museum Agricultural site by Anthes Brothers Movers. The movers did a great job and the granary arrived in excellent condition. More work is needed on the interior of the granary so that folks will be able to enter the granary. Stop by and take a look during FFD and also see the new displays in the building. The Wehrmans have done a fantastic job recreating a grain elevator of the past.




