

School Tours 2017 will be held on Wednesday, May 9th, Thursday May 10th and Friday May 11th. The theme for this year is THE THUMB: Naturally Sweet and will feature sugar beets, honeybees, sorghum/maple syrup and apples used for food for animals and people in the early 1900's and today.

Greg Alexander and Tammy Grifka are coordinating all activities relating to the Theme. They will be supported by MSU Extension, Department of Environmental Quality and the Department of Natural Resources plus other organizations who will provide educational material for life long learning.

Monday, The sorghum press will be demonstrated during School Tours at our April 2nd and Monday April 30th. All are invited and encouraged to attend.

The sorghum press will be demonstrated during School Tours at our Sugar Shack by Mark Battel. Sorghum is a tropical grass which has a stalk filled with a sweet, watery juice used for syrup and the stalk for fodder or silage. The press was used to squeeze sugar water out of the sorghum cane and then it was boiled down to make syrup that was used as a sweetener in cooking. A horse or mule can be hitched to the pole and as the horse moves in a circle someone would feed the sorghum cane in one side of the press and sugar water would run out the bottom.

Thumb Quilt Trail

The Thumb Quilt Trail Committee is excited to report that we now have 86 quilt blocks on barns, businesses and 7 historical museums in the Thumb. Those attending the Michigan State Quilt group meeting were treated to the premier of a documentary on **Donna Sue Graves**, who started the quilt trail movement nationwide. Barn Restoration

We completed the window project last fall. The job focused on the 62 windows in the Octagon Barn. Following the goal of maintaining the historical integrity of the Barn, we either replaced (11 windows) or repaired the frames, sills, glass and glazing of all the windows. We have a group of volunteers led by Richard Stacer and we contracted with Emanuel Mullet Construction to help us complete the job.

Denny said, "The average age of our volunteers is approximately 70 years young. You see the picture. We do not climb as we did years ago but there is much work we can do and we have lots of fun. Lunch time is my favorite time as we have lots to talk about. The crew refer to me as LT that stands for lunch time as I never miss lunch.

One has to have patience and be willing to do detailed work to repair the windows. When you are finished there is a real sense of accomplishment and appreciation for what it took to build the Barn. You also appreciate your team who provide their time and skill to complete the job.

A large number of people have gone before us. We find their "fingerprints" on the Barn everywhere. We developed a sincere appreciation for all the folks that have worked on the Barn in the past. The barn is a special place.

The outhouse was originally located at the Orr-Moore Schoolhouse on the southeast corner of Deckerville Rd. and Hurds Corner. Leave it to Katie to take care of every detail.

When the need to document the historical developments at the Octagon Barn Agricultural Museum, Katie once again stepped forward to undertake this responsibility. Because of her leadership and organizational abilities, after two years of research and writing, a sixty page history book, The Story of the Mud Lake Estate was completed.

Through the years many folks who had experienced the One Room Country Schools classroom came forward with items that they wanted to donate to our Museum. The quantity of memorabilia was quite amazing and soon the need for a building to house all these items was a reality. Once again. Katie stepped forward to become part of the group organizing the One Room Country School Museum. So from organizing a few newspaper clippings, Katie has left her mark in oh so many ways while always being cheerful but getting the job done. She'll be missed. A Bit of History and an Announcement too

In 1994 community interest was growing to SAVE THE OCTAGON BARN. A group was formed known as The Thumb Octagon Barn Committee and their goal was to preserve this unique, historic Barn on its original site. Fundraisers were planned to draw attention to the project and raise money to assist with immediate needed repairs to the Barn. On October 11, 1994 the group changed its name to Friends of the Thumb Octagon Barn and became a 501-C3 tax exempt, non profit organization.

In 1995 it was felt that it would be beneficial for this newly formed organization to inform those interested in working to SAVE THE OCTAGON BARM with a quarterly informational newsletter. Margaret Sergeant, Gagetown, volunteered to prepare a single page letter using a rudimentary program that she had used with her elementary students. Margaret's neighbor took one look at the letter and said, "I think we can do better." Brenda Papkey indeed was amazing in what she was able to do with her computer skills in developing a very professional letter from April 1996 until the Spring of 2003. The letter started out as a single page but eventually became eight pages. When Brenda was no longer able to work on the newsletter, Bob Hirn came to the rescue and suggested that Lois Moslander who worked at the Rawson Memorial Library in Cass City and produced several newsletters for different organizations might be able to perform the Design Layout for the Barn's newsletter. Lois' first letter was the Spring of 2003 and she continues to work her magic arranging the text into the newsletter format and does a wonderful job.

That's the history of the letter that has been published from 1995 until the present. That's a lot of letters. Now it is time for this responsibility to be passed on and are we ever lucky. President, Rose Putnam, retired from Chemical Bank at the end of 2017 and has agreed to take on the responsibility of coordinating our newsletter. Rose has worked closely with the newsletter editing and contributing articles. I know she will be outstanding. It will be terrific.
