Our mission statement above details that the Barn complex is an educational tool. Well it sure was for the 1.068 students who came through the site on May 8. 9. and 10. The attendance was down a little this year due to the uncertainty of schools making up snow days. However, that did not deter all the fun for those who came. There were 348 chaperons attending along with students and 175 volunteers on site over the 3 day period. Of those, 45 had never volunteered at school tours before. Our volunteers appreciated the lunches provided by Karen Lenton and her crew of volunteers.

There were over 25 stations offered to the schools. One of the most popular is the farm animals. This year for the first time **Sierra Schumacher** brought her farm animals. Sierra is the niece of **Bill and Kitty Sampson** who had previously brought their petting zoo for many



years. Sierra helped Bill and Kitty for the past two years and was happy to return on her own. The students enjoyed the wooly goats, the minidonkey and horse, "Fat Boy" her steer and a pot belly pig. She had help from **Kaylynn Stanton** (to the left) shown with "Fat Boy." Kaylynn brought her rabbits, which are always a favorite for students to handle and pet.

Sierra (below) commented "I loved to watch the students reactions when they came up to the animals. Some were so open and couldn't wait to pet the



animal where others were very timid or even scared."



Pickles are planted and will be picked and run through a pickle sorter by Terry Keinath of Reese as they would have been when they came from the field. Our hope is for the potatoes to make it in time to pick during FFD. It has been so wet we just got them planted in late June. We will have returning steam engines, sawing demonstrations, shingle mill with branded commemorative shingles, old engines and tractors, cider pressing, working grain elevator and grist mill. The Blacksmith Shop, Sugar Shack, One

Room School House and Museum will be open for all to see. There will be live animals, spinning and weaving and many exhibits on display in the Barn. The Purdy Home and Garage will be shined up and looking beautiful for all visitors. Happenings and food on the front lawn include Live Music, Fried Donuts, Apple Cider, Homemade Pies and Fresh Churned Ice Cream, Hog Kettle Popcorn and delicious Soft Pretzels.
