The Executive Board at the Thumb Octagon Barn is very thankful for the year we had and to the hundreds of volunteers that made it possible. In spite of the pandemic we were able to open and move forward together and we were especially thankful we could host Fall Family Days once again.

Looking back this year has been like no other in our history. It was most definitely not a normal year nor did we expect it to be so. I am often asked, "How did you do at Fall Family Days this year"? My initial thought is 100% better than last year when we had to cancel the event. The answer kicks the can down the road, but we are indeed thankful for just being able to offer the event.


We had a very good year and a very good Fall Family Days event but the pandemic did and still continues to impact the Thumb Octagon Barn. Like other businesses in our community we are recovering from the pandemic but we feel we are moving in a positive direction.

We cancelled School Tours for 2021 but we were able to open our Daily Tours Program in May and our number of visitors increased this year by 38.5%. Our tour guides were busy with daily tours, weddings and clubs coming to visit the site (related stories on pages 2 & 3). Our early projections for Fall Family Days were high but this fell back with the arrival of the Delta variant. The Fish Fry (story on page 5) was well attended with 964 served. This is down slightly from our average of 1,000 served yearly. Saturday was our best day but Sunday was down probably due to the threat of rain. Overall combining both days we were down 20% from the record year in 2019.

Again we are thankful for the volunteers and patrons that came all year and at Fall Family Days. We often compare our operation to be like farming in that you have to have a little help from Mother Nature. Rain at the right time is good, at the wrong time not so good. Every year you give it your best shot and that is all you can do. We will take what we got and are thankful to be moving in a positive direction.

Getting Ready for FFD

As Dennis Anderson mentions above,

FFD event. On Monday, Labor Day, September 6th, a hard working crew spent
most of the day putting up all of our tents.
On Tuesday, we had a storm come through
the Thumb with high winds and all the tents
were blown down. Wednesday was a busy
day doing the job once again.



Summer Activites at the Barn

Our **Open House Weekend** was held on Saturday, July 24 & Sunday, July 25. All buildings were open on site for our visitors to enjoy. We had a very active turn out, as a lot of tourists were out and about looking for something to do. Don Beavers from the Sanilac Petroglyphs has been sending guests our way and we also recommend that our visitors visit the Petroglyphs. We thank all of our volunteers who were on site to help.

We were privileged to have the **Michigan Jamboree of Model T's** event organized by the **Model T-Ford Club International** with its 39th tour visit on August 26th. This was the first time the group has visited the Thumb of Michigan. 94 cars

were registered for the three day event. Tim Juhl of Forester Township organized the event. The majority of the group were from Michigan with 25% coming from 11 other states. The group found that the people in the Thumb are the friendliest people and local folks stepped in to help when a car needed repairs. They found the Thumb Octagon Barn to be a "very remarkable Barn" and enjoyed all the exhibits on the grounds. Of all the stops during the three day tour, the Thumb Octagon Barn was rated at the top of the list. Our volunteers were privi-



leged to have the opportunity to see and experience all the exquisite cars on the tour. Thank you for choosing to tour the Barn.

Thumb Easy Riders



Cost is \$2.00 donation fee for each student and each chaperone attending. There will be over 25 stations available for learning/exploration.
