

Fall Weddings at the Barn




On Saturday, September 18, 2021, Lauren Hass and Nehemiah Messing from Bad Axe were joined in marriage at the Thumb Octagon Barn.

J School Days... School Days... Dear old golden rule days... J

The kids might not have been singing this song and do-



ing a program on what school was like in the early 1900's but there were many memories shared during FFD 2021of what life was like going to school in a one-room schoolhouse. Parents and grandparents were quick to point out the "board of education" and many families were surprised to learn

their elders had experienced that "dreaded board of education!" Schoolmarm, **Beth Brown**, also learned the history behind one of the carvings in a desk, when a visitor pointed to and told who carved the initial "n" and how the next year someone else tried to change it to an "a"! A map of Michigan hung on the bulletin board and attendees would "pin" where their one-room schoolhouse was located (had over 100 pins). One visitor had attended 2 one-room schoolhouses in different parts of the state.

Fall Family Days Observations

band; the Ubly FFA; the Unionville Sebewaing Area National Honor Society; and the Peck FFA (who had a goat that decided to take a walk-so cute!)

Some of the new members were there helping grandparents to be Vendors and Demonstrators. They are helping more than we know, assisting them with set up and sales. They are part of a more loving generation. Maybe Covid brought us all just a little closer.

A young new member signed up and said, "I just love this, I am so glad I came with my grandpa." He had a work apron on, so he had been out in the field somewhere.

Take a child to the children's play area, or for a ride in the barrel train. The children dug in corn and took shoes off to feel the texture of the grain. They washed clothes in a tub, and hung them to dry, pumped water into a pail, and rode on a straw bale with a saddle. They also tried out stilts, hula hoops, and crutches. The smiles are why we do what we do, with the love of the past.
